the human, the unique person in one another. St Ambrose Barlow is a better, more interesting, more vibrant, lively place for the contribution each of them has made, even if they don't yet realise it themselves. Whether or not they know it, whether or not they feel it, they have so much to show for the last five years. And we, as a school and as the adults who make up the staff of this school, are richer for the presence of each of them. Special thanks and recognition must also go to you, the parents, carers and family members who have supported them and us throughout the past five years. Sad though we are to see them go, we are excited for the next step on their journey and look forward to hearing all about their achievements and remaining part of the lives they lead in the years ahead. We all hope that whatever else they do they are, in St. Paul's words, always 'ambitious for the higher gifts', the greatest of which is love.

Of course, our school contains another four year groups, full of brilliant young people who have also been part of this journey and whose skills, talents and achievements we celebrate in this newsletter. As we break for the half-term I wish them and you and happy, and hopefully sunny, week off.


ART FOCUS


