



SCHOOL THAT MATTERS: A STRONG FINISH

You'll be familiar with that phrase now, after 38 weeks of school life. We describe our vision for this year as one that ensures school 'matters' to our young people. We alighted on this because of all of the research and experience that showed young people were disengaging from school and attendance plummeting. The idea is simple: it is up to the adults to ensure that school is place where young people feel a sense of purpose, belonging, safety and affiliation. I don't think we're there yet for every pupil (I don't think any school is), but as we end the year I do think that recent events in our school are a very positive indicator that school matters.

Our attendance has been high throughout the year, above national and local averages, especially for pupils who are on the SEND register. I know that like any school there are young people at St. Ambrose Barlow RC High School who find coming in hard, that school is a difficult place to be for all sorts of reasons, but I also know that our provision for supporting young people to attend well is very good indeed. The work of teams of staff who provide extra nurture and support for young people's mental health, wellbeing, attendance is strong and is deeper and wider than

The difference these staff make, along with the wider team who teach and support, is huge. You can see it in our attendance figures that place us in the Top 25% of all schools in England. None of this happens by accident and at this point I would like to pay tribute to all of the staff in our school for being such a brilliant team, for their dedication, for their humour and their commitment. We are lucky to have them and their expertise.

It would be remiss of me not to mention that ultimate test of school staff that we endured in late February: a visit from our friends from Ofsted. Their call could not

have been better timed and after two days that felt like two years, we were pleased with the outcome: Good and a bit of Outstanding. But that was just a point in time, confirming what we already knew and providing public reassurance of the standards in our school, as well as removing the risk of forced academisation. We quickly moved, we don't do anything for Ofsted, but it's a useful badge to have.

One of the greatest developments this years has been the opening of our Francis Centre, an Enhanced Resource Provision for Autistic pupils. Very quickly the young people and staff in that centre have become a vital and essential part of the school, even celebrating with the Year 11s when they left after their exams. The pupils in the Francis Centre spend between 40 and 100% of their time in classes around the school and we are all looking forward to centre expanding further next year.

Another big focus this year has been pupils' personal development, the wider achievement that makes school somewhere that matters more, that creates the memories that last long after our recall of verbs, algebra and equations has faded. And for this element of school life there is so much to mention.

Our pupils have dazzled, performed, spoken, competed, visited, created and more. All of this is driven by the staff team who have forged inspiring experiences throughout the year and there are more to come. Even more uplifting is the sheer number and range of pupils who have chosen to be involved or who have been instrumental in setting up clubs for others.

In the creative and performing arts we have been treated to the best year I can recall in terms of breadth and depth of experience. A large group of our pupils directed and performed Macbeth at the Contact Theatre in Manchester, drawing great plaudits from their audience and the critics. Our Christmas Concert and Senior Citizens dinner was an excellent event, drawing together generations from across our community and showcasing our brilliant choir who have also performed in the community and at various school events. Our Art department has inspired pupils to ever higher standards with visiting artists and trips to galleries to augment the outstanding work produced by pupils every day. And the Drama department has produced many fine examples of pupils using their oracy skills to speak in public, most recently at the National Literacy Trust conference at the Lowry.

Pupils have led various events and activities such as Black History Month and have enjoyed the enrichment supplied by visiting speakers, trips to galleries and theatres and a range of off-site experiences. Our Duke of Edinburgh participants have continued to secure Bronze and Silver Awards in ever growing numbers and the Geography department trip to Malham is now an fabulous annual fixture for nearly 100 pupils to test their fieldwork skills and enjoy some wild swimming (hopefully planned). Most recently we saw Year 10 pupils jetting off to Madrid.

Our Library continues to grow as a hub for book clubs, the book fair, World Book Day, author visits and the Salford Children's Book Award. In Science huge numbers of pupils secured the CREST Award and we took part in activities for National Science Week. For yet another year running our pupils produced degree-level work with the Brilliant Club in conjunction with university staff and pupils especially in Year 10 had their horizons broadened with college trips, employer encounters and work experience.

Once again we focused even more on celebration and recognition, issuing over 3000 certificates, awards and badges, which will culminate our memorable

(outstanding) fun day and sports day in July – making more memories. In sport we saw successes for many teams and a huge medal haul in the Salford Athletics competition. The incredible work of our PE department has secured the school a Gold SportsMark award for the levels of participation in games and sport.

Just this week we have seen pupils co-ordinating the wonderful Culture Day, leading assemblies, teaching their peers about the 40 different languages spoken in our school, sharing food and stories that reflect their heritage. We also celebrated through our Fun Day and Sports Day, with every pupil taking part in the joy.

I often say that I love coming to work each day and I mean it. We have a lovely school, great pupils, supportive families and very dedicated staff, all of us bound by a strong sense of identity and shared faith. This summer we say goodbye to a small number of staff:

- Miss Evans, literacy tutor, who is training as a teacher
- Miss Tehseen, English tutor, who is also leaving to start teacher training

- Mrs Mckay, Teacher of Maths, who is leaving to pursue new opportunities in life
- Mrs Howarth, who is retiring as a teacher of Modern Languages after 36 years in teaching

They represent the culture of care and service that has come to characterise our school and on your behalf I wish them the very best for the next stage in their lives – they will be missed but are always part of our family.

My thanks to all of you for the year gone by and every good wish for the holiday ahead.

- 17. Our EBSA team embracing World Wellbeing Week


- 18. Well done to our Year 7 and 9 students who represented St Ambrose Barlow in the Salford Schools Athletic Competition yesterday.


