SCHOOL THAT MATTERS: CITIZENS OF THE WORLD

This week a group of thirty Year 10 pupils flew out to Madrid for a week of Spanish immersion in Spain's great capital city. By all accounts they had a fabulous time experiencing the sights, cuisine, culture and life of this great metropolis. On the first evening I received a text from one of the staff who was leading the trip to say that an elderly Spanish woman had approached her and complimented the Year 10s on their interactions and behaviour, observing how pleased she was to have them in her home city. This small interaction says a great deal about the power of school overseas trips. Whilst for the pupils the visit is all about expanding horizons and experiencing something new, we often overlook the extent to which the very presence of enthusiastic and curious young people is something that others find uplifting. That Spanish woman was not just proud to see her city being enjoyed, she was invigorated by the way our pupils were enjoying it and so two nationalities and generations were brought together in mutual appreciation.

Next week we will celebrate what we call Culture Day. On Tuesday, July 16th all pupils are encouraged to attend in clothing that represents their national identity, to share food that speaks of their heritage and, in general, to celebrate the diversity of our school - something that gives us strength.

The purpose of this day is many-fold. We learn from one another's cultures; we are exposed to new ways of thinking; we recognise our common humanity and the things that bind us, while acknowledging our differences. We also gain an appreciation of one another in a deeper way than simply getting to know our interests or skills - our sense of national identity runs deep. These benefits are also a way of combatting racism or prejudice, particularly in a time when influential voices are very keen to divide us and

I am very proud that our school is made up of over 40 nationalities (it wasn't always that way) as this reflects the changing face of Salford and the UK and the richness, contribution and energy that immigration and change has brought to us. The same is true of the way that overseas trips for pupils, like many other enriching experiences, bring fresh eyes to ancient places. As a Catholic school, ensuring a welcome for new faces, especially those who are new to our country, and an appreciation of one another's differences and culture is at the very heart of our faith








DIVERSITY IN MATHS
