




ART FOCUS


This week's art piece has been created by Ava in Year 8. It is a mixed media collage based on Abstract concepts studied this term.





Overall, unemployment in Scalgod is high. The ward with the highest unemployment is Pendleton and Charlestown with 48.4% wremployed. The ward with the highest unemployment is Quay with 15.3% unemployed. Quay Ordrall and Bladgnian + Trinity may have lower unemployment because they border Manchester City Centre where there are lots of job opportunities. Also the Quay has been regenerated and Media City provides a lot of job in BBC and TV.

Overall, poor health in Salzord is quite high. The word with the highest percentage of poor health is Little Hulton. This may be because of its high unemployment percentage which is 44.7, nearly haby. Unemployment leads to less income which leads to cheaper/lower quality things which would then lead to poor health. BOOK OF THE WEEK

Crossing the Line by Tia Fisher - Shortlisted for the Yoto Carnegie Medal 2024

'Do you feel safe?' A powerful novel exploring how teenagers can be swept up into county lines.

Erik's life has been falling apart ever since his dad died. Homework and being good at school stop feeling important when you're the new man of the house. When Erik's bad behaviour attracts the wrong crowd, he's sucked into a terrifying new world of drug dealing, trap houses and violence. Making money feels good but Erik soon learns that a small favour can become a huge debt. And when his sisters' lives are threatened, Erik will have to cross one more line to save them. Written in verse, this is a poignant story about seeking safety and asking for help in times of crisis.

EDUCATIONAL VISIT TO POLICE CUSTODY SUITE

Greater Manchester Police are working in partnership with St Ambrose Barlow. An interactive package has been designed to allow young people into Police custody for an educational visit. On the date of the visit, the custody suite will be non-operational. The visit will include a tour around a Police custody suite and procedures explained about Police processes.

Children will have the opportunity to learn about law and legislation and toured around the various Police rooms where photographs, fingerprints, and DNA are obtained. The children will be shown the menu that is served in custody and will have the opportunity to visit a cell.

Salford's School Engagement Officer Pc 18573 Darren Wright and Inspector Corless will deliver the interactive package with the support of School staff being present throughout the tour. There will be an opportunity for Q&A during the session.

YourPolice.UK is the NPCC's Digital Youth Engagement channel which has been building up an audience of engaged young people on social media for over five years.

The channel puts out a new post every day about policing, the law, youth issues and the space where these all intersect, providing a trusted source of information, helping young people make informed decisions and helping to keep vulnerable people safe. The channel is monitored twelve hours a day, seven days a week and, in a friendly and human tone, we respond to every single comment. This helps us to build trust and confidence, safeguard vulnerable young people and put a human face and voice to policing across the country.

Founded on the principles of Procedural Justice Theory, we are honest, factually accurate and human. We let young people know how they should be able to expect to interact with policing, what their rights are, and what they can do if they are treated unfairly. By being factual, honest and conceding that, sometimes, some people have negative experiences with policing (and letting them know what they can do about it), we can start to build trust and confidence and let young people know that we are there if they need us.
