they have for kindness, for empathy, for decency, is as worthy of an award as their skill in writing or in Science.

In future years we will make our awards even bigger and better to take in a great number of pupils. For the time being, however, my thanks to all staff who made it possible, to the pupils who were so brilliant and to parents and carers for attended. Special thanks must also go to City Mayor Paul Dennett who, despite the demanding schedule of his position on election day, joined us to speak and to give out awards and certificates.

Today we also announced the results of our mock election, with the party Vision, winning by a landslide. The process has been a very interesting one, with pupils responding brilliantly to the challenge of persuading the school 'constituency' and having some sense of the relationships between power and responsibility. To stand in assembly and hear the passion and commitment of the young people in our four political parties was genuinely uplifting, a rallying call from the young showing that they are keen for politics and leadership that is inclusive, unifying and creative.
